Having been evicted from CF&I mining company's housing, over 1,000 striking miners and their families endured the coldest winter in Colorado history in tents. On April 20, 1914, the seven-month strike came to a brutal end when the Colorado National Guard and the mining company's private security forces attacked the encampment. Luis Tikas, a leader of the striking workers, born in Crete, was killed. Three women and eleven children were asphyxiated and burned to death. The Ludlow Massacre, as it came to be called, was a pivotal moment in the history of American labor. "To Palikari" tells the story of the massacre and Tikas's role. Prof. Annaliese Bonacquista will introduce the documentary and Jim Marketos will discuss the massacre's impact on American labor law.
